The Lowell Wrestling team placed 2nd overall in the State 1A/2A Championships on March 1st with impressive contributions by these four champions. Chasen Clayton started the finals off with a close 3-2 win over the #1 ranked opponent in the 132# class. Josh Cardwell followed with a 5-1 decision in the 153# final following earlier round pins of 1:00 and 1:37. Austin McNichols hardly broke a sweat winning all three of his matches with pins of :46, 1:02 and 1:37 to capture the 160# title. Then Tanner Harvey won at 182# with a 26 second pin in his championship match. Colin Cash placed 2nd at 220#. Placing 3rd were Gabe Anderson at 170#, Grant Chapman at 182# and Tommy Harvey at 132#. Also in the finals was Hayden Trimble at 145#.

"Lowell Music continues another strong year with several events on the calendar for 2014. The Lowell Junior Choir recently participated in the first-ever Just Sing It! Middle School Choir Festival, held February 20th at Springfield High School. As is often the case, we were the only 1A/2A school in attendance, yet our kids once again showed themselves to be some of the best-behaved and best-prepared young musicians in our area. Performing alone and with a massed choir under the direction of LCC's Matt Svoboda, the kids had a fun and successful experience, and plan on attending for many years to come.

Next on the calendar is the 2014 Metropolitan Choral Festival, held on April 22nd at the Hult Center for the Performing Arts! The Lowell Concert Choir will be participating for the first time in this annual event, which includes choirs of all sizes from our region. During the evening concert, our high school group will perform alone and also be joined by other participants for two combined numbers. The Lundy Spring Concert (grades K-5) is set for Tuesday, May 27th; the Spring Band Concert (grades 6-12) will be on Thursday, May 29th; and the Spring Choir Concert (grades 7-12) will on Tuesday, June 3rd. 


Lowell Fire District Employees and Volunteers

Position Description: This position is for operations and maintenance of all aspects of a water and sewer utility. Summer Is On Its Way

With the warmer weather fast approaching, don't forget to take time to start making your home and property wildfire safe. Here are some tips to help you protect you home from any possible wildfire threats:

- •Prune low hanging limbs to reduce ladder fuels
- •Clean roofs and gutters of pine needles and dead
- •Keep flammable plants and mulches at least 5 feet away from your home's perimeter
- •Use low–growing, well pruned and fire-resistive plants around home
- •Screen or box-in areas below patios and decks with wire screening no larger than 1/8-inch mesh
- •Sweep decks and porches clear of fallen leaves
- •Move woodpiles away from the home during nonwinter months
- •Bring doormats and furniture cushions inside when an area is threatened by a wildfire
- •Close garage doors when leaving your home in the event of an evacuation

Your home ignition zone extends up to 200 feet—and it's quite common to have neighbors whose home ignition zone overlaps yours. Buildings closer than 100 feet apart can ignite one another if they are in flames. In addition, many communities have commonly owned property, including natural or wooded areas that can pose fire risks to all. This means that to be most effective, neighbors need to work together and with their local fire service to achieve greater wildfire safety.

Together, community residents can work with agencies and elected officials to accomplish the following:

- •Ensure that homes and neighborhoods have legible/ clearly marked street names and numbers
- •Create "two ways out" of the neighborhood for safe evacuation during a wildfire emergency
- •Create phone trees to alert residents about an impending fire
- •Review any existing community rules or regulations on vegetation management and construction materials to see if they are "Firewise-friendly"
- •Use the "Ready, Set, Go!" program with the fire department to educate neighbors
