

School Bus Safety!

The Lowell School District wants to remind drivers it is unlawful to pass a school bus when the red lights are flashing. All lanes of traffic must stop in both directions and on both sides of the road as long as a painted median strip or turn lane does not create two separate roads.

School buses have flashing amber and red lights near the top of the bus on the front and rear. They are also equipped with a stop arm that extends from the bus near the driver's window when the red lights begin to flash as well.

Flashing amber lights warn surrounding drivers that the bus is about to stop on the road to load or unload children and alert drivers to prepare to stop. When the red lights flash, drivers must stop before reaching the bus and remain stopped until the bus driver turns off the flashing red lights.

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
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LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move...



City Council and other committee/commission actions:

At their November 2 regular meeting, City Council took the following actions:

- Held a public hearing on the sale of 205 E. Main St. to Lowell Investment Properties, LLC in the amount of \$375,000.
- Approved a motion to authorize the City Administration to execute a purchase and sale agreement for 205 E. Main St. with Lowell Investment Properties, LLC.
- Approved a library consulting agreement with Hummel Consulting.
- Approved a boundary and partition survey proposal.
- Approved a grant application from the Pine Needler's Quilt Group.
- Authorized the City Administrator to execute a contract for debris removal and clean up for the 205 E. Main St. live burn training.
- Approved a resolution to initiate amendments to the City's floodplain development code.
- Held a joint meeting with the Parks and Recreation Committee. At the joint meeting, both City
 Council and the Parks and Recreation Committee agreed: to reserve the current City Hall parking
 lot for future parking at Paul Fisher Park; to approve a shade tree program for Paul Fisher Park;
 and to hold a tree lighting ceremony in December.

At their November 16 regular meeting, City Council took the following actions:

- Approved a memorandum of understanding with Northwest Code Professionals related to floodplain management.
- Authorized the purchase of 100 new water meters.
- Approved an application with Business Oregon to finance the library and City Hall construction project.
- Discussed the possibility of increasing police services within the City. After the discussion, City Council expressed an interest in learning more about expanding its current law enforcement services contract. Additional discussions on this issue are anticipated in December/January, along with community outreach on this issue soon.

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FROM THE LOWELL FIRE DISTRICT

Last month the Lowell Rural Fire Protection District was able to complete a live fire training on Main Street in Lowell. This opportunity gave a lot of the volunteers a chance to see how all the training we put them through comes together. The volunteers in our area go through several weeks of training, between book work and hands-on training. The one area that is harder for them to train on is live fire training. Live fire training either comes from an actual emergency or a training fire. Training fires are either accomplished through an acquired structure (which has several government regulations) or purchasing a training burn structure (which could be a cargo container). Either way we were able to get a lot of good training from this structure.

Let's Talk Candle Fire Safety

Candles may be pretty to look at, but they are a cause of home fires — and home fire deaths. Remember, a candle is an open flame, which means that it can easily ignite anything that can burn.

Candles and kids sometimes don't mix. Think about using flameless candles in your home. They look and smell like real candles. Never leave a child alone in a room with a burning candle. Keep matches and lighters up high and out of children's reach, in a locked cabinet.

"CANDLE WITH CARE"

Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep. Keep candles at least 12 inches away from anything that can burn.


IF YOU DO BURN CANDLES, make sure that you...

Use candle holders that are sturdy, and won't tip over easily. Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface. Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any loose clothing away from the flame. Don't burn a candle all the way down — put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container. Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home. Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles during a power outage.


