


# Lowell Fire District Reminds Everyone to Be "Wildfire Safe"

Yes, Fire Season is once again upon us and the Lowell Fire District would like to remind everyone that there are a number of ways property owners and tenants can reduce the likelihood of wildfires. There are also a number of ways to reduce the chance of your home or outbuildings falling victim to a spreading wildfire should one occur.

To help prevent wildfire damage, create a "DEFENSIBLE SPACE" around your home by keeping grass and shrubs cut to a height of less than six inches around your structures. Keep grass and shrubs well irrigated and green to make them less susceptible to fire. Keep combustibles away from structures, keep fir needles and branches clear of roofs and gutters. And remember, outdoor burning is prohibited this time of year due to fire danger.

**Notice of 2022 City Council Election and instructions on how to file.** Notice is hereby given that on November 8, 2022 an election will be held for the purpose of electing three persons to the Lowell City Council to fill the following positions: Position 1, Position 2, and Position 3. Each candidate for an office listed above must have resided within the Lowell city limits for a minimum of 12 months preceding the election and must be registered to vote in the State of Oregon. Candidates may pick up election packets at City Hall, 103 E. 3rd St., Lowell, OR 97452 during normal business hours or printed off from the website. **Public notice of second reading and public hearing of Ordinance 307.** The Lowell City Council will conduct a public hearing and second reading of Ordinance 307 at 7:00 pm on August 16<sup>th</sup>, 2022 at 70 N. Pioneer St., Lowell, OR 97452. Ordinance 307 will ban the sale and manufacture of psilocybin products within the City. Copies of Ordinance 307 are available for public inspection at City Hall, 107 E 3rd St., Lowell, OR 97452. After second reading approval by City Council, Ordinance 307 will be referred to the voters of the City for approval during the November 8, 2022 election. Members of the public may participate in person or electronically through Zoom by PC, tablet, or phone. For instructions on how to join via Zoom, go to the following web address and select the meeting in question: https://www.ci.lowell.or.us/calendar. Any written comments concerning Ordinance 307 received by the City prior to the public hearing will be provided to the City Council. Any interested party may submit oral or written comments at the public hearing. **Utility assistance program.** The City Council renewed the "Utility Assistance Program." Eligible households can receive a 25% discount on their water and sewer bills. To qualify, household income limits cannot exceed the Oregon Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program maximums. Proof of income is required. For more information, and to sign up, contact City Hall in person or by phone at (541) 937-2157.

Note from City of Oakridge Police Chief on firing splat ball guns, paint ball guns, and other pneumatic guns. Shooting someone with a "splat ball gun" could result in a charge of assault or physical harassment. Shooting someone's property could result in a charge of criminal mischief. Discharging weapons on or across highways, ocean shore recreation areas, or public utility facilities is also a violation of state law. There are various crimes and violations that could be enforced if an officer responded to a call of this type, depending on the circumstances.

- Approved an agreement for an office copier.

The Code Committee met on July 18 to review updates to the City's "development code."

Actions from the July 19 City Council meeting:

- First reading approval of Ordinance 307.
- Accepted a \$50,000 grant from Lane County to build a conference room at 70 N. Pioneer St.
- Approved a library consulting agreement for \$5,000.
- Voted to renew the "Utility Assistance Program."
- Selected priorities for the League of Oregon Cities' 2023 legislative priorities ballot.
- Voted to approve a salary adjustment for the City Administrator based on the results of the annual performance review.

## **Summer Water Safety Reminder**

Whether at home or enjoying our local waterways, it is always important to keep safety in mind when in or near water. Drowning can happen at any time of year, but be especially cautious during the summer months when drowning incidents can increase by as much as 89% as compared to the rest of the year.

When the weather turns warm, as it is now, everyone naturally wants to be in or around the water to help stay cool. Hanging out at the pool or the lake on a hot day is a great way to beat the heat. For people between the ages of 5 and 24, drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death.



It doesn't have to be that way, though. Most water-related accidents could be avoided by knowing how to stay safe and following a few simple guidelines. Learning how to swim is essential if you plan on being on or near water. Many organizations provide swim instruction to folks of all ages, check to see what classes are available in our area.

Here are some Swim Smart Ideas

- Alcohol and Water DO NOT MIX. Anytime you are on or near the water, stay sober. A leading cause of boating accidents is due to alcohol being on board. And I don't mean just on board the boat. Just like driving a car, drinking alcohol and driving a boat can cause disaster as well as land you in jail.
- "Buddy up!" Always swim with a partner, every time whether you're swimming in a backyard pool or in a lake. Even experienced swimmers can become tired or get muscle cramps, which might make it difficult to get out of the water. When people swim together, they can help each other or go for help in case of an emergency.
- Get skilled and be prepared. Learning some life-saving skills, such as CPR and rescue techniques, can help you save a life. A number of organizations offer free classes for both beginning and experienced swimmers and boaters.
- Know your limits. Swimming can be a lot of fun but if you're not a good swimmer or you're just learning to swim, don't go in water that's so deep you can't touch the bottom and don't try to keep up with skilled swimmers. That can be hard, especially when your friends are challenging you — but it's a pretty sure bet they'd rather have you safe and alive.
- Swim in safe areas only. It's a good idea to swim only in places that are supervised by a lifeguard. No one can anticipate changing currents, sudden storms, or hidden underwater dangers. In the event that something does go wrong, lifeguards are trained in rescue techniques. Recognize that swimming in an open body of water (like a river, lake, or ocean) is a lot different than swimming in a pool. You need more energy to handle the currents and other changing conditions in the open water.
- Some areas with extremely strong currents are off limits when it comes to swimming. Do your research so you know where not to swim, and pay attention to any warning signs posted in the area.
