After a vote by coaches from across Oregon, eight Lowell athletes were recognized as some of the best football and volleyball players in the entire state:

Annabelle Pickett (Jr) - 2nd Team Libero Jamar Thurman (So) - 1st Team Running Back, 2nd Team Defensive Back Jesse Neet (Sr) - 2nd Team Punter Justus Thurman (Jr) - 2nd Team Wide Receiver Lehi Zylstra (Sr) - 1st Team Linebacker Lydia Plahn (Sr) - Honorable Mention Paul Clark (So) - 2nd Team O-Line, 3rd Team D-Line Rowan Files (Jr) - 2nd Team Linebacker, 3rd Team Tight end

On top of that, **Jamar Thurman** was named 2A football's Co-Offensive Player of the Year. Jamar led the 2A level in rushing yards and touchdowns and had the 4th most rushing yards in all levels combined. Coach Pat Todd said, "Jamar has a burst of speed that can separate him from most defenders and a wiggle that makes it hard to get a grip on him in traffic."

Jamar was honored and grateful to receive the All-State Player of the Year award but is still striving for more. "My goal for next year is to help win a state title," said Thurman. "I know if we work hard as a unified group, nothing can stop us from bringing home a championship for our school and our community for the first time in history." Jamar is thankful for his coaches, teammates, parents, brothers, and God for the roles they have played in his success, and he hopes to "always represent my school, community and my Thurman name with honor and pride."

Alumnus Spotlight: Ryan Hendrickson spent most of his childhood in Oregon and considers Lowell to be his hometown. While at LHS, he participated in sports and "gained my confidence as a man through wrestling and football." He graduated in 1997 and his father encouraged him to "serve your country and see what life has to offer," so he enlisted in the Navy.

After serving four years in the Navy, Ryan enlisted in the Air Force and then transferred to the Army in 2008. He was part of the U.S. Army Special Forces. He had many military deployments during his service including Iraq, Afghanistan and countries in South and Central America. When Ryan was a Green Beret he was injured by an improvised explosive device that caused severe injuries. He had over 24 surgeries and spent many torturous months rehabilitating. Defeating all odds, he returned to active duty and was redeployed in 2012. Ryan's service went above and

beyond and he has received many awards including the Silver Star, four Bronze Stars, a Purple Heart, and an Army Commendation Medal with Valor.

While in rehabilitation Ryan began writing to deal with the trauma. After encouragement from others, he had his book, <u>Tip of the Spear</u> printed in 2020. It is a detailed account of his life and military career. He felt others may benefit from his life experience. "I want people to read my book and realize that you can go through a life-altering catastrophic experience, but it doesn't have to end your life or end who you are."

Ryan is currently conducting landmine and explosive hazards removal in Ukraine with his charity organization, Tip of the Spear Landmine Removal. He is also a motivational speaker and recently shared a message with the students and staff at LHS. He encouraged them to think about who they want to be and what they want to be remembered for.

Ryan currently lives in Florida with his wife, Dawn, and he occasionally makes the trip to Oregon to visit friends in Lowell.

Thank you, Ryan, for your sacrifice and service, making a difference in this world, and inspiring others to do the same.

Dogs running at large. The City has received a lot of complaints about dogs running at large. It is a Class C violation, punishable by a fine up to \$250, for dog owners to let their dogs be at large.

Dog and cat license reminder. All pet owners are required to obtain dog and cat licenses for their pets within city limits. The license fee pays for the City's contract with Lane County Animal Control. A benefit to licensing your dog, and keeping the license on their collar, is that it will make it easier for your dog to be returned to you if an animal control officer ever picks them up.

Actions by City Council and other committees/commissions

At the January 3, 2023 regular meeting, City Council took the following actions:

- Elected Don Bennett to serve as Mayor and elected Gail Harris to serve as Council President
- Approved Ordinance 308 related to open burning regulations
- Approved Resolution 797 to adopt guiding principles for the City Council
- Approved an agreement for improvements with Jerry and Julie Valencia for a development that the Planning Commission approved
- Approved a salary adjustment for the Library Director based on the results of the 6-month performance review

The Planning Commission met on January 4, 2023 to hold public hearings on ordinances adopting text amendments and rezoning properties within the downtown regulating plan. After receiving public comments on the proposed ordinances, the Planning Commission voted to continue the hearing until February 15.

At the January 17, 2023 regular meeting, City Council took the following actions:

- Approved Ordinance 307 relating to the Library Board and library concept of operationsElected Don Bennett to serve as Mayor and elected Gail Harris to serve as Council President
- Received a presentation on system development charges updates
- Approved an improvements agreement with the Lowell School District for a gym and classroom expansion project
- Reviewed materials associated with an participating in Lane County's emergency management plan update
- Reviewed protocols to responding to security alarms at 70 N. Pioneer St.

The City Council held a work session on January 21, 2023 to develop and prioritize goals for 2023.

The Planning Commission held work session on January 18 and January 25 to continue reviewing proposed updates to the development code.


Free Storytime at Stomping Grounds Coffee
