#### Promoting Literacy and Encouraging a Love of Reading — Read Across America

Read Across America Day is celebrated every year on March 2<sup>nd</sup> in honor of the late, great, Dr. Seuss. Notice to abate noxious vegetation. Pursuant to Lowell Revised Code (LRC) Section 5.123, notice is hereby given that no owner or person in charge of property may allow noxious vegetation to be on their property or on the public right-of-way abutting their property. It shall be the duty of an owner or person in charge of property to cut down or to destroy noxious vegetation. For parcels one acre or larger in size, noxious vegetation need only be controlled 20 feet from an adjoining property where development has occurred and is not required to be controlled adjoining undeveloped property unless specifically requested by the owner of the undeveloped property. The City intends to abate noxious vegetation within not less than ten days of a final notice to abate such vegetation sent to the property owner and that all costs of doing so will be charged to the owner of the property being abated. A citation may be issued in lieu of or in addition to abatement action.
