

Fire Prevention Week October 8th - 14th

Why is October National Fire Prevention Month? The goal of Fire Prevention Month (and week October 8th – 14th) is to raise fire safety awareness, and help ensure your home and family is protected. In 1922, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) named the second week of October Fire Prevention Week in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire in 1871.

This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Cooking safety starts with YOU. Pay attention to fire prevention." works to educate everyone about simple but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe when cooking.

What if someone in my home is deaf or hard of hearing? There are smoke alarms and alert devices that alert people who are deaf or hard of hearing. These devices include strobe lights that flash to alert people when the smoke alarm sounds. Pillow or bed shakers designed to work with your smoke alarm also can be purchased and installed.

Open School Board Position

We currently have an opening to sit and serve as a Lowell School Board member. This position is by appointment and runs until June 30, 2025. This position would allow a member of our community the opportunity to help guide our school district through budgetary considerations, contract discussions, and superintendent support.

Our school board members have immense skills and abilities that they each bring to the table. While it may seem like a daunting task, the new board member will be given opportunities for professional development, training and education to increase their skills and abilities as a leader in the district. Our new appointee may attend conferences, study sessions, trainings, and regional meetings to increase their knowledge base and feel confident in their skills as a leader. Twice a year, our board is afforded the opportunity to attend the OSBA conference. This allows team building as well as training and learning opportunities.

Applications will be accepted until October 8, 2023. Applications will be reviewed at a study session held on October 9, 2023. The Lowell School Board will appoint the new sitting member on October 23, 2023, to serve out the remainder of this term. At that time, the sitting member may run for election to continue their service.

As always, we are grateful to those who willingly give their time and service to the students and staff of the Lowell School District. Lowell is a special place with an amazing community and that doesn't go unnoticed or unappreciated.

Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports

This year, the focus of the Lowell School District is reinforcing positive behavior. The behavior team was created to focus on how to reward the kids who are doing well. With ten staff across the district, coming together to find ways to reward students, recognize their behaviors and promote the positive, we are hoping to see some changes in student culture. District-wide Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports are front and center.



At Lowell Jr/Sr High, Pride bucks are given out to students when "caught" making good decisions, promoting positive behaviors and being good citizens. These "bucks" can be used to purchase concessions. Students of the month are chosen from kids who were nominated for exemplifying the behavior focus of the month. For the month of September, the focus was on Respect. The students who most exemplified this trait will become students of the month. In subsequent months, the focus will be on Encouragement, Discipline, Determination, Engagement, Vibrancy, Improvement, Leadership, and Success, which also happens to spell out RED DEVILS! More activities are in the works to continue to recognize short-term and long-term behavioral successes of the students.

At Lundy, students receive "Bees" to acknowledge their success. Each week, Ms. Edgerton has a drawing of the bees that students earn. Winners get to choose prizes from the prize cart. Every six weeks, students who have exhibited positive behavior and met the requirements will get to participate in an incredible activity. The first one to kick off the year in October is a bounce house! Quarterly, students apply to be self-managers and are recognized for their ability to be positive and maintain a level of trust and leadership throughout the school.

Lowell has amazing students, and this is just one way that we can work together, across the district, to promote the positive and focus on the good. We want our students to know that we see them and the great work that they are doing every day!

Grant Funding for Water System Upgrades

In September, the Oregon Business Development Department informed the city that it has received a grant of \$306,420. The grant is to pay for upgrades to the water treatment plant. State Representative Charlie Conrad assisted the city in obtaining the grant from Oregon Lottery program funding.

The upgrades are to replace the supervisory control and data acquisition (SCADA) system at the water treatment plant. The SCADA is the control system for the water plant. This includes the computer interfaces that allow Public Works staff to monitor and control operations at the water plant. It also includes devices called programmable logic controllers (PLC).

PLCs automate the water plant. They use sensors to gather information about the water plant, such as pH levels, sediment levels, water temperature, chemical concentrations, flow rates of water, reservoir levels, and so on. A computer then analyzes this information and sends commands to devices such as valves, pumps, motors, alarms, and so on. Without the PLC, Public Works staff would have to do all this work manually.

The city's PLC failed about a year ago. Luckily, the city has been able to use a loaner system until we can purchase a new one. If this system were to fail, however, this would require Public Works employees to operate the water plant manually on a continuous basis, which is not feasible with our small staffing level.

This grant funding will allow the city to install most, if not all, of the data collection and management recommendations from the 2022 water master plan. This includes adding SCADA capability to the entire water system. Another component to this project will be to add cybersecurity features to the water system's computer network.

Our plan is to design the system so that it will be compatible with the water treatment plant and water reservoir upgrades that the master plan recommends over the next 10 to 20 years. This project represents a significant investment in the city's ability to continue meeting increased demand for water.


Calendars
