Also recognized were the team members and coach of the 1975 Lowell Volleyball team, pictured below. Barbara Powell introduced the



team by sharing interesting stories about this team's pioneering effort to get to State once the passage of Title IX required equal funding for girls' sports.

Present for the event was longtime Fall Creek resident and Class of 1947 graduate, Larry Walsh. Larry was raised up Winberry Creek, attended grade school at Unity Elementary, and graduated from Lowell High School in 1947. While at LHS he played baseball and football and was the school photographer for the year-books.

#### **Keeping Our Schools Safe**

School and learning go hand in hand. What also goes along with school and learning? Safety and security. As we all know, if you do not feel safe, you cannot learn, grow, and thrive. For this reason, the Oregon Department of Education and Lowell School District require drills, training, and professional development to help us be prepared for the needs of our students. This includes mental health training, suicide prevention, sexual assault identification and reporting, campus threats, and natural disaster.

In October, our entire campus and all our schools participated in a lockdown drill. This is required twice a year. This drill taught us what we are doing well, where we need to add additional equipment, areas of needed communication and so much more. We also participated in the Great Shake Out. This drill teaches students and teachers what to do in case of an earthquake. We immediately followed the drill with a bus evacuation drill to help students and staff practice how to exit safely if needed.

Later this year, our staff will participate in a training for Adi's Act. This requires our district to create a plan around suicide prevention, intervention, and postvention. The goal is to create a place for students to report, our staff to intervene, and for follow-up to occur. If anyone is in crisis, they can go to <a href="https://988lifeline.org/">https://988lifeline.org/</a> to chat or text/call 988 to be connected to receive compassionate support and care.

Lowell School District is compliant with Erin's Law as well. This requires the development and adoption of child sexual abuse prevention programs for students in kindergarten through 12th grade. Our staff are trained annually not only in how to identify students who may be the victims of abuse, but also how to report.

One of the focuses this year throughout the district and schools across the state is Social and Emotional Learning. Our students have faced many challenges over the last few years, and it shows. SEL is the process of developing the self-awareness, self-control, and interpersonal skills that are vital for school, work, and life success. Lowell Jr/Sr High and Lundy Elementary staff are participating in professional development as well as implementing comprehensive positive behavior improvement plans at each of the schools.

Our district participates in SafeOregon. SafeOregon gives kids, parents, schools, and their communities a way to report safety threats or potential acts of violence confidentially or anonymously. #### Information on Lookout Point Reservoir drawdown.

The city has received comments and questions from water customers about the Lookout Point drawdown and its impact on Dexter Reservoir, where the city gets its drinking water. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has started a deep drawdown of Lookout Point to comply with a court order to improve fish passage at the dam. You may have noticed increased turbidity, or sediment, in Dexter Reservoir.

Public Works staff are taking preventative measures to ensure that the water plant can continue functioning as turbidity increases in Dexter Reservoir. Those measures include evaluating new chemical processes that can remove sediment more efficiently compared to our current processes. Staff are also increasing the level of carbon filtration to improve taste and appearance.

#### Update on City Council business.

• Changes in state law now require city camping regulations to be "reasonable as to time, place and manner with regards to persons experiencing homelessness." The City Council has begun working on changes to city ordinances to comply with the new law.

- The City Council approved an annex into Lane County's "Multi-Jurisdictional Natural Hazard Mitigation Plan." This will now make the city eligible to apply for "Hazard Mitigation Assistance" funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency.
- The City Council has approved an agreement with the Oregon Building Codes Division to start an e-permitting system for building permits and land use applications. The e-permit system will digitize the building permit and land use application process, making it easier for the city and property owners to keep track of building permits. The new e-permit system is expected to be online sometime in 2024.

#### **New Burn Regulation**

This year we are enacting a new outdoor burn regulation within the Lowell Fire District. This new regulation is to make backyard burning safer for the community. You can find this new regulation at lowellfiredistrict.org, under the Services tab. You can also stop by the Main Station at 389 N. Pioneer Street in Lowell to get a copy. Burn safe.

#### Some Reminders for November

- -Open burning season Call LRAPA for Burn Advisory 541-726-3976 Option #3.
- -Clean your fireplace and woodstove flue before the really cold weather hits. A clean flue makes your woodstove happy and keeps your home safe.
- -Check your smoke detectors monthly Assure you have a good battery in your detector.
- -Be prepared to weather winter storms Make a kit and stay informed. Be able to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours.

The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District would like to remind you that candle-caused fires are preventable. According to the State Fire Marshal's Office, in the last decade from 1995 to 2004 candle-related fires in Oregon have increased 20%. Oregon's Life Safety Team and the Office of State Fire Marshal have launched a candle safety campaign titled *Before you go out, Blow it out!* 

Keep an eye on your burning candles! While candles are popular for home decorating, they are dangerous, too. It's amazing how fast fire spreads, and how much damage is caused, when a flame from a candle ignites nearby material.

Oregon Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM) data from 2000 through 2004 cites candles as causing 769 fires resulting in 7 deaths and 81 injuries. During 2004 alone, reported candle-caused fires were responsible for \$43.3 million in property loss. Forty percent of candle fires begin in the bedroom.

#### Increase your holiday safety when using candles by following these important tips:

- Blow out all candles before leaving the room or before going to sleep.
- Keep candles away from things that burn. Keep candles at least one foot away from combustibles including clothing, curtains, upholstered furniture, greenery, and decorations.
- Always use a sturdy metal, glass or ceramic candleholder. Make sure the candleholder is big enough to catch dripping wax.
- Place candles out of reach of small children and pets.
- Keep candles out of high traffic areas.
- Trim wicks to one-quarter inch before lighting.
- Avoid candles with items embedded in them such as twigs, flowers or leaves. These items can ignite or even explode.
- Adopt these tips as candle safety rules in your home.
- Maintain working smoke alarms on every level of your home, outside each sleeping area and in every bedroom.

#### **Message from the Corps of Engineers:**

Use extreme caution when recreating at Lookout Point Reservoir. Unknown hazards may be exposed due to low reservoir levels. Avoid the muddy lakebed to prevent getting stuck and needing rescue. Motorized vehicles are not allowed in the lakebed. It is a criminal offense to excavate, remove, damage, disturb, or collect any items on public lands such as rocks, minerals, vegetation, and historical or archaeological artifacts.
