FROM THE LOWELL FIRE DISTRICT

Keep It Safe This July 4th

The Office of State Fire Marshal (OSFM), Oregon fire service, Keep Oregon Green, natural resource agencies, Oregon fireworks wholesalers, and safety experts encourage Oregonians to "Keep it Legal and Keep it Safe" when using fireworks. The 2015 Oregon fireworks sales season opens Monday, June 23 and runs through Sunday, July 5. The OSFM and their partners want everyone to know what fireworks are legal in Oregon, where they are permitted, and the important steps to take for fireworks safety.

"People often forget that legal fireworks can only be purchased from Oregon permitted fireworks retailers and stands," says State Fire Marshal Jim Walker. "And, regulations limit where those fireworks may be used. For example, fireworks are prohibited on all Oregon beaches, in parks, and campgrounds." July 4th holiday forest visitors are advised to leave all fireworks at home. The use of fireworks is prohibited on all national forestland, and most other public lands. "Fireworks compound the threat to already dry forests," states Keep Oregon Green President Kristin Babbs. "Enjoy fireworks where they belong: on the pavement, safely away from houses, vehicles, and flammable vegetation."

Oregon law bans possession, use, or sale of fireworks that fly, explode, or travel more than six feet on the ground or 12 inches into the air. Fireworks commonly called bottle rockets, Roman Candles, and firecrackers are ILLEGAL in Oregon.

There were 165 reported fireworks-related fires in Oregon during 2014, resulting in 33 injuries and more than \$178,000 in property damage. Over the past five years, from 2010 through 2014, there were 839 reported fireworks-related fires in Oregon resulting in one death, 159 civilian injuries, and more than \$3.9 million in property damage. Officials may seize illegal fireworks and fine offenders up to \$1,000 per violation. Those who misuse fireworks or allow fireworks to cause damage are liable and may be required to pay fire suppression costs or other damage. Parents are also liable for fireworks damage caused by their children.

"All Oregonians share the responsibility to use only legal fireworks and use them carefully," adds Walker. "And we encourage you to be aware and considerate of neighbors and their pets, before deciding on when and where you choose to light fireworks."

The OSFM encourages everyone to use the four B's of safe fireworks use:

- * Be Prepared before lighting fireworks: keep water available by using a garden hose or bucket.
- * Be Safe when lighting fireworks: keep children and pets away from fireworks.
- * Be Responsible after lighting fireworks: never relight a dud. Wait 15 to 20 minutes then soak it in a bucket of water before disposal.
- * Be Aware: use only legal fireworks and use them only in legal places.

Residential Burn Season Is Now Closed

The Residential backyard burn season is closed so outdoor burning of yard debris is prohibited until October 2015.

Recreational (campfire) burning is allowed under controlled conditions. The ground must be cleared of all combustible material with a fire ring or shelter no larger than nine square feet surrounding the recreational fire. Flames may not extend greater that 3 feet above fuel. Fuel (wood) must be clean and dry to reduce the production of smoke. The burning of building materials or yard debris for a recreational fire is prohibited. Person(s) must be present at all times during burning and fire must clearly be utilized for recreational purposes only. In regulated use areas, campfires may require a permit through the Oregon Department of Forestry.

When the fire danger reaches the high to extreme range, recreational fires may also be prohibited. For more information contact the District office at 541-937-3393 or the Oregon Department of Forestry at 541-726-3588.

Firefighter Attends National Fire Academy Training Course

Lieutenant Bob Graham recently attended a National Fire Academy Training Course held in Emmitsburg, Maryland on the campus of the National Fire Academy. The course "Challenges for Local Training Officers", provided cutting edge information and was presented by nationally known instructors.

The National Fire Academy (NFA) is operated by the US Fire Administration under the Federal Emergency Management Agency and is responsible for providing educational resources to America's fire and emergency services. On-campus lodging is provided at the Academy for the weeklong course. The lodging and transportation are provided by the NFA. The only cost to the District was for meals.




The information and training Lt. Graham received will be utilized to enhance our local fire and EMS training programs and will be an extremely valuable tool for future training program development.

Wildfire Prevention Checklist

It looks like summer is here with temperatures rising quickly, so remember to prepare your home and property for the possibility of wildfire. Here is how you can prevent wildfire on your property. There are some fairly easy things you can do to help make your home and outbuildings safe from wildfire. Review this checklist to help make your home wildfire safe. For more information on wildfire prevention practices, go to the District website or visit our main station in Lowell, 389 North Pioneer Street.

- Is your address clearly visible from the road? If you need an address marker, the district can provide one. Contact the district office.
- Is your driveway/roadway clear of obstructions; can a fire engine or other emergency vehicles get to your home? Driveways/roadway surfaces need to be at least 12 feet wide and have at least 13 ½ feet height clearance so the emergency vehicles can get to your home. Curves must be of adequate dimension to allow for emergency vehicle clearance, and there must be room for vehicles to turn around.
- Remove limbs and branches that overhang your roof. Prune lower limbs to a height of 15 feet and thin trees or remove them from within 30 feet of your home.
- Keep your roof and gutters free of debris, leaves, needles, small branches and moss.
- Keep woodpiles, firewood and other combustibles at least 30 feet from you home and out buildings.
- Block off openings under your home and decks with solid sheeting or fine-mesh wire, 1/8th inch metal screen works best. Screen attic vents and louvers also.
- Use only fire resistive roofing on all buildings. Class A asphalt shingles, metal to tile.
- Develop an escape plan and an emergency action plan. If a wildfire occurs near your home, you should have a plan for evacuation that includes important personal items and escape routes. Build an emergency evacuation kit that you can easily take with you if you are asked to evacuate your property in an emergency.
