Morgan Stevenson is enrolled in the Advanced/Intermediate EMT program, with Kate Bishop attending EMT classes at LCC working towards her paramedic license.

The Paramedic program is a two-year Associate Degree program with the Advanced/Intermediate EMT program being a non-credit one to two term course. The EMT course is part of the first year of the Paramedic program and lasts most of the first academic year for students.

As approximately 86 percent of the District's calls are medically related, EMTs and Paramedics are of great



value to the District's patrons and provide an extremely important service.

The District supports the efforts of our members to gain as much medical training as they are willing to pursue.

Backyard/Outdoor Burn Season Starts

Now that we are getting a bit of rain and the nights are putting down some good moisture, fire season has officially ended on October 26th. That means outdoor/backyard burn season can get under way.

Remember that Lane Regional Air Protection Agency (LRAPA) now regulates the production of smoke in Lane County and before you burn your brush and tree trimmings, you must verify that it is a legal burn day with LRAPA by calling the "Backyard Burn Advisory" line or checking LRAPA's website.

The advisory is made on a daily basis and the authorization to burn is only for the day of the advisory. Call 541-726-3976 option 3 or go to www.lrapa.org for the advisory and more information about open burning regulations in Lane County.

Get Prepared

As the summer months come to a close and the weather starts to let us know that fall is here, it is a good time to start thinking about and preparing for winter storms that can cause some major inconvenience and down right disastrous conditions.

Now is the time to get prepared for local disasters that might occur during the winter months. The first order of business should be to build an emergency kit that can keep you and your family supplied for at least 72 hours. Here is a suggested kit that you can build at home and store in a medium to large size "tote" container for use if disaster should strike.

Be prepared to improvise and use what you have on hand to make it on your own for at least three days, maybe longer. While there are many things that might make you more comfortable, think first about fresh water, food and clean air.

Recommended Supplies to Include in a Basic Kit:

- Water one gallon per person per day, for drinking and sanitation
- Non-perishable food at least a three-day supply
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA
 Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for
 both
- Flashlights and extra batteries, seal the batteries in containers to reduce moisture and help prevent corrosion
- First Aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help

- Filter mask or cotton t-shirt, to help filter the air
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener if kit contains canned food
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Important family documents
- Items for unique family needs, such as daily prescription medications, infant formula or diapers

Consider two kits. In one, put everything you will need to stay where you are and make it on your own. The other should be a lightweight, smaller version you can take with you if you have to get away.

Make a plan, in advance, for what you will do in an emergency. Be prepared to assess the situation. Use common sense and whatever you have on hand to take care of yourself and your loved ones.

Develop a Family Emergency Plan. Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so plan how you will contact one another and review what you will do in different situations. Consider a plan where each family member calls, or emails, the same friend or relative in the event of an emergency. It may be easier to make a long distance phone call than to call across town, so an out-of-town contact may be in a better position to communicate among separated family members. Be sure each person knows the phone number and has coins or a prepaid phone card to call the emergency contact. You may have trouble getting through, or the phone system may be down altogether, but be patient. Depending on your circumstances and the nature of the emergency, the first important decision is whether you stay put or get away. You should understand and plan for both possibilities. Use common sense and the information you are learning here to determine if there is immediate danger. Watch television and listen to the radio for official instructions as they become available.

Lowell Area Projects Update

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers would like to inform the community about three upcoming projects that have been in the works for several years and are being implemented this November:

Lookout Point Boom Installation – Corps contractors will install a floating boom in the reservoir to keep boats out of the restricted area near the dam. This will help keep boats away from the dam's spillway gates when water is being spilled to benefit fish downstream. A helicopter will install in-water anchors required to keep the boom in place.

Dexter Dam Tree Removal Project - A local contractor will clear trees and brush from several acres on the south end of Dexter Dam near Dexter Park that is interfering with the dam's drainage system. The vegetation must be removed to help ensure the continued safety of the dam. The Corps will donate larger felled trees to non-profit organizations and government agencies for watershed enhancement projects.

Middle Fork Erosion Repair Project - About 210 cubic yards of large rocks (3-7 tons each) will be delivered and stored on the south side of the river below Dexter Dam. These rocks will help stabilize a portion of the riverbank that was eroded away by high flows in December 2010, causing collapse of a fishing platform. Rock placement has not been scheduled yet, but the work will not interfere with fishing season.

Your Help is Needed to Protect the Quality of our Drinking Water

What is backflow?

Backflow is the undesirable reversal of the flow of water from its intended direction in any pipeline or plumbing system. Backflow is dangerous because it can allow drinking water in plumbing systems to become contaminated and unusable.

What is a backflow device?

A backflow device is also known as an RP or DC valve. RP stands for Reduced Pressure, DC stands for Double Check. This device is installed onto your plumbing system to protect your drinking water and the city water supply from contaminants.

RP/DC valves are required when a house or building is equipped with an irrigation system, fire suppression system, or a large boiler (hereinafter referred to as Systems). Contaminants can enter an irrigation system from fertilizer or pesticides that are sprayed onto lawns. In the case of a boiler or fire suppression system, water sits stagnant or trapped in these systems, which leads to a build-up of bacteria and increased mineral content from the piping system.

If there is a water leak in the house, house water service break, city water main break, hydrant flushing, or hydrant use due to a fire, the water pressure in the house or city water mains can drop lower than the water pressure in the Systems. This can cause water from the Systems to backup into the drinking water supply.

If a drop in city or building water pressure occurs, the RP/ DC valve will open up, dumping water out rather than allowing the potentially contaminated water to back-flow into the water supply. For these reasons, Oregon State Law requires the use of an RP/DC as outlined in the OAR 333-061-0070. All city governments must comply with these laws. The law not only requires the use of an RP/ DC device but that the device must be tested once every year. Only a licensed plumber with a Cross Connection Certification License can test and certify the proper operation of an RP/DC valve. Once the valve is tested, the certification paperwork is forwarded by the plumber to the city. It should also be noted that no building, house or system that currently requires protection by an RP/DC is "grandfathered" from not having the proper device installed.

Is it really important to prevent backflow?

Absolutely. The Oregon Administrative Rule requires all public water systems in the Commonwealth to operate an on-going program to protect the public water supply from contamination from possible cross connections. The most effective method for the water utility to meet this requirement is to require customers to install a backflow pre-

venter on the main supply line to their property or facility, thus protecting the community water system from any cross connections that may be present inside a customer's plumbing system. All water users benefit from an active, on-going cross connection control program that includes the installation of backflow preventers.

Why does the customer have to pay for and install the backflow preventer?

The backflow preventer is installed to protect the public water supply against possible hazards in the customer's plumbing system. The actual or potential cross connection belongs to the property owner and not to regulatory officials or the water utility. Once the water goes beyond the meter, water quality could be altered. The water utility does not want the water back, nor do the water customers want to purchase used water. If a backflow preventer is required to keep the water safe, then the person who created the cross connection (actual or potential) should purchase, install and maintain the backflow preventer.

What are common cross-connection hazards?

Underground sprinkler systems

Chemicals common to landscaped areas and pet waste can flow into sprinkler piping through sprinkler heads or cracked piping. For this reason, all sprinkler systems in the State of Oregon must be equipped with an adequate, correctly installed backflow protection.

Pools and spas

Chemicals used to keep pools and spas sanitary can also be harmful to drinking water. Therefore, a pool or spa with a direct piping connection to the City of Lowell water system must have proper backflow protection.

Heating, cooling and fire sprinkler systems

Many common systems in use today have chemicals that stop algae growth or keep fluids from freezing. These chemicals can be a hazard if allowed to enter the public water system. Therefore, heating, cooling and fire sprinkler systems must have adequate and correctly installed backflow protection when connected to the public water supply.
