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LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move ...

Community Members Attend School Open Houses, Learn About Improvements and 10-Year Plan

Lowell School District opted for a "show and tell" approach to describe the results of its 10-year master planning process instead of focusing on the analytical and technical reports associated with the process.

Held in April on one unseasonably warm Tuesday evening and the next rainy Saturday morning, the Open House approach is one that community members appreciated. "We'll certainly continue to invite residents to gather for discussions like these," said Superintendent Walt Hanline. The open houses gave us the chance to have meaningful discussions with the community, and allowed those who attended to talk to the architects and hear from the others who have helped to produce the Master Plan that will guide our efforts in the coming decade."

The Open Houses included a presentation about the planning process and the recommendations that grew from that effort, and a tour of Lundy Elementary and Lowell Junior/Senior High Schools. Participants ducked into the plumbing chase at one school, inspected the deteriorated asbestos tile in another, observed drooping ceiling tiles, and walked through the plan to build a new gym that would free the current, non-regulation compliant gym for use as a multi-use space that would serve as cafeteria, performing arts venue and space for community gatherings.

Discussion also covered timelines and budgets. If the community chooses to proceed with the first \$4 million in work, the district could leverage \$1.1 million in recently awarded, state-provided funds for seismic improvements, and possibly another \$4 million in matching funds from the State – resulting in \$9.1 million in improvements at a cost to local taxpayers of \$4 million. The \$4 million would be issued in bonds, at an annual estimated cost of \$1.14 per \$1,000 assessed value of each home.

The next steps in the process are:

- April 25th: The Board unanimously approved the proposed Master Plan.
- June: The school district applies for matching funds.
- July: The district learns about the status of matching funds.
- August: The Board decides whether to seek voter approval to fund the work. This decision depends on the outcome of the matching fund request.

Lowell Fire District Budget Committee Meeting

Pioneer St., Lowell at 6:30 p.m. The purpose of the meeting is to hear the Budget Message and to receive and review the proposed budget for fiscal year 2016-2017. Volunteers Receive Skid Training

The State Department of Public Safety Standards and Training (DPSST), provided advanced driver training in Goshen the weekend of the April 22nd. The program was sponsored by DPSST and the Goshen/Pleasant Hill Fire Districts, and provided training in vehicle skid avoidance and proper techniques in safely managing a skid in fire and rescue vehicles should a skid occur.

The program provides classroom as well as real life driving instruction and practice on a closed course. The key to the training is the "skid vehicle" operated by DPSST. The truck can be manipulated to replicate any type of adverse road condition and gives students a chance to see what it's like to have a truck (fire engine, rescue) skid on a slick surface and how to safely manage a skidding truck.

Oregon is one of just a few states in the nation to offer this type of training for firefighters and emergency responders and eight of our fourteen eligible district volunteers have completed this extremely valuable training.



Use the "Zone Concept" to Help Protect Your Home From Wildfire

The primary goal for FireWise landscaping is fuel reduction — limiting the amount of flammable vegetation and materials surrounding the home and increasing the moisture content of remaining vegetation. The home itself and everything around it up to 100 - 200 feet is known as the 'home ignition zone.' In areas across the country where the risk of wildfire is high, the home ignition zone extends up to 200 feet beyond the actual home structure. Within this 200 foot area, there are three zones:

<u>Zone 1</u> encircles the structure and all its attachments (wooden decks, fences, and boardwalks) for at least 30 feet on all sides. *Note:* the 30-foot number comes from the very minimum distance, on flat ground, that a wood wall can be separated from the radiant heat of large flames without igniting. In this area:

- Plants should be carefully spaced, low-growing and free of resins, oils and waxes that burn easily.
- Mow the lawn regularly. Prune trees up six to ten feet from the ground.

- Space conifer trees 30 feet between crowns. Trim back trees that overhang the house.
- Create a 'fire-free' area within five feet of the home, using non-flammable landscaping materials and/or high-moisture-content annuals and perennials.
- Remove dead vegetation from under decks and within 10 feet of the house.
- Consider fire-resistant material for patio furniture, swing sets, etc.
- Remove firewood stacks and propane tanks; they should not be located in this zone.
- Water plants, trees and mulch regularly.

Zone 2 is 30 to 100 feet from the home, and plants in this zone should be low-growing, well irrigated and less flammable. In this area:

- Leave 30 feet between clusters of two to three trees, or 20 feet between individual trees.
- Encourage a mixture of deciduous and coniferous trees.
- Create 'fuel breaks', like driveways, gravel walkways and lawns.
- Prune trees up six to ten feet from the ground.

<u>Zone 3</u> is 100 to 200 feet from the home and this area should be thinned, although less space is required than in Zone 2. NOTE: Because of other factors such as topography, the recommended distances to mitigate for radiant heat exposure actually extend between 100 to 200 feet from the home – on a site-specific basis. In this area:

- Remove smaller conifers that are growing between taller trees. Remove heavy accumulation of woody debris.
- Reduce the density of tall trees so canopies are not touching.

District Receives Bids For Station 2 Construction



The Fire District is currently receiving bids for the construction of the Engine House for the Fall Creek Station. Bids will be received until 5:00 p.m. Friday, May 6th. It is the intent of the District to award the construction bid at the May 17th Board Meeting. A construction calendar will be established following the award. The Engine House is designed as a forty foot by forty foot, two-bay building, able to house two pieces of fire apparatus. The current manufactured home will remain as living quarters for personnel, with its replacement scheduled for 5 to 8 years.

Improvements to the Training Station 3 will also continue. Later this spring reconfiguration of the interior of the container units will begin to include a "live fire" area and construction of several different props simulating structural components of buildings to practice on.

City Beat

Stormwater Management

Stormwater runoff occurs when precipitation from rain or snowmelt flows over the land surface. The addition of roads, driveways, parking lots, rooftops and other surfaces that prevent water from soaking into the ground to our landscape greatly increases the runoff volume created during storms.

In Lowell, much of the runoff is eventually collected by the City's stormwater system. This includes approximately 3.5 miles of stormwater pipe, 32 manholes, 94 catch basins, and one sediment basin. Water enters the system through catch basins, is conveyed through storm pipe, then is discharged at various locations into Dexter Lake.

To help ensure the health and quality of our watershed, remember that any chemicals or other harmful substances applied to the ground may contaminate stormwater and end up in Dexter Lake. Always follow product labels



and be mindful of these common contaminants:

- Oil, grease, metals and coolants from vehicles
- Fertilizers, pesticides and other chemicals from gardens and homes
- Bacteria from pet wastes and failing septic systems
- Soil from construction sites and other bare ground
- Soaps from car or equipment washing
- Accidental spills and leaky storage containers

The City of Lowell Public Works Department provides routine maintenance of the stormwater system, such as clearing debris from catch basins. Additional work is completed through a contract with Lane County. If you notice any stormwater problems, such as a blocked drainage channel or catch basin, please report them to the Public Works Department at 541-937-2157. By City Administrator Jared Cobb

Discover Your Watershed in May: Fishy Field Day Saturday, May 14th — 10 a.m. - 1 p.m. Elijah Bristow State Park

There are 32 species of fish native to the Willamette Basin, but few people can name more than salmon, sturgeon and trout. Coming in May, Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife biologist, Brian Bangs, aims to change all that during a field tour and presentation of the lesser-known fish species of the Middle Fork Willamette during our Discover Your Watershed Fishy Field Day, at Elijah Bristow State Park. Brian will highlight fish such as Oregon chub, largescale suckers, and sculpins in explaining the diversity and ecology of our river's native non-game fish, and walk participants around sloughs and ponds at the park to observe fish. He'll also speak about the ecology of the river system and the history of conservation of the Oregon chub, a minnow that was recently recovered from the federal Endangered Species Act.
