Lowell School District: Providing Options for Parents and Opportunities for Students

We are truly excited about the beginning of a great new year. In 2013, with the arrival of the new administration under the direction of the Board of Directors, Lowell School District has focused on providing a small school environment with options and opportunities for the students and parents.

Our options for parents are Lundy Elementary K-6 School; Mountain View Academy, a K-8 Site-based Charter School: Lowell Secondary School, Grades 7-12 and Bridge Home School Academy (Grades K-10, to start). We have revitalized our Parent Teacher Club, Education Foundation, and School Site Council. Our enrolment has grown as reflected below.

Since 2013, the following additional opportunities have been provided to our students: **Lundy Elementary** – Power Hour After School Tutoring, Afterschool Care, Summer Recreation Program, Summer Camp Program, Summer School and the elimination of combination classrooms; **Lowell High School** – Advanced Placement Courses in European History, U.S. Government, Statistics, World Culture, English Composition. In addition to the historical courses in Drafting, Woods, and Construction, we also offer additional College Now courses in Medical Terminology, Biology, Anatomy and Physiology. Student activities have also increased including Link Crew, GEAR Up College Bound Program, Associated Student Body, and a computer in the hands of each student.

Summer Fun for Students in Lowell

The Lowell Summer Recreation and Fitness Program had a great turnout for its first year. The participants, ranging from grades 3 through 6, enjoyed activities such as rocketry, soccer, football, hiking and geocaching. Each week's activities were themed, with participation exceeding expectations. The program also included free breakfast and lunch, and a running program to increase focus and energy levels. The participants ran a combined total of 4,399 laps, equaling 1,150 miles. Kids wrapped up the end of the program with a trip to Splash!

Summer School and Summer Camps Provide Academic Tutoring, Special Interest Instruction and Fun to Lowell's Children

In addition to the summer recreation and fitness program that was offered to Lowell students this year, the Lowell School District also offered academic summer school at Lundy and Lowell Jr./Sr. High School. The focus of summer school at Lundy was to improve skills in reading and math while the focus at the Jr./Sr./ High School was in academic credit recovery. Specialty "summer educational camps" were also offered in science, drama and multicultural studies.



The focus of the science camp this year was in Marine Biology. Students attending the camp took field trips to the Oregon Dunes, Yaquina Head Tidepools, the Hatfield Marine Science Center (for instruction about adaptations of coastal intertidal zone organisms) and to the Oregon Coast Aquarium where displays helped students feel immersed in the deep ocean and get close views of ocean wildlife. Each of the other camps kept students engaged in honing their drama



skills and leaning about other cultures south of our USA border.

Students in the Jr./Sr. High also participated in summer camps in medical careers and leadership experiences. MedSplash was a medical career camp sponsored through the Lane ESD and the GEAR UP grant made it possible for students to attend leadership camps at Western Oregon State College.



Finally, even our very youngest and their parents benefited from academic opportunities as

the Lowell School District participated in the KITS program (Kids in Transition) which was designed to help incoming kindergarten children become familiar with "school life" and learn special skills that will help them be more successful as they begin kindergarten this year. This particular program also provided parents of kindergarten and first grade students an opportunity to meet each other and learn strategies to engage their children in learning activities at home.

Next year the Lowell School District hopes to be able to continue offering these outstanding opportunities for stu-

dents. Look for recreational and camp program information to come out in late April ((and early May.

Call for Volunteers!

The City of Lowell is soliciting applications for the Planning Commission and Budget Committee. Volunteering for the City is one of the best examples of government and people working together for the good of the community. It will give you an insider's look at how local government works, and an opportunity to share your talents, skills, and feedback on how to better serve our residents. If you are interested in serving, please read the overview of each board and then follow the application instructions below.

Planning Commission

The Planning Commission is composed of five (5) members appointed by the City Council. This board operates in an advisory role in the preparation and revision of the community's comprehensive plan and local land use regulations. The Planning Commission also reviews and makes decisions on development proposals, including site plans and subdivisions.

There is currently one (1) vacancy on the Planning Commission. This position is for the remainder of an unexpired term ending December 31, 2017.

Budget Committee

The Budget Committee consists of the entire City Council and five (5) citizen members appointed by the Council who examine, analyze and recommend a budget to the Council. This committee is active for about six (6) weeks in April and May of each year, with occasional meetings held throughout the year.

There is currently (1) vacancy on the Budget Committee. This position is for the remainder of an unexpired term ending December 31, 2018.


- Developed Mission and Vision statements; discussed prioritization of objectives and evaluation criteria established. Action to be taken at a future council meeting.

A Reminder that Fire Season Is Not Over Yet

Fire Season is still with us and it is important to keep fire safety in mind at all times. Outdoor burning is prohibited and may open in October depending on weather and environmental conditions. Campfires and/or warming fires in most locations are prohibited and will remain prohibited until vegetation fire levels are greatly reduced by significant moisture. Contact the district office for more information on current fire safety considerations in the area.

Ever Think About Becoming A Firefighter?

Ever want to do something new and exciting? Want to learn new and valuable life skills? Think about joining the Fire Service and help your community.

Volunteers are critical to our nation's fire and emergency services. 69% (or 786,150) of firefighters in the U.S. are volunteers. These volunteers save communities \$140 billion annually. However, the number of volunteers has declined by about 12% since 1984. During the same timeframe, call volume has nearly tripled, largely due to the increase in EMS calls. In 2013, there were over 31 million calls to local fire departments.

The volunteer fire service is an aging population. Since 2000, there has been a 14.9 percent drop in the number of firefighters under the age of 40 in communities like ours. Communities our size rely almost entirely on volunteers.

There are many reasons for these trends, including:

- increased time demands placed on firefighters and EMTs for more rigorous training requirements
- proliferation of two-income families whose members have less available time
- younger people moving out of smaller communities for better job opportunities

The Lowell Rural Fire Protection District is almost all Volunteer. We have a half-time (20-hour per week) paid Fire Chief and a full-time (40-hour per week) paid Training Officer. The District will soon be adding another forty-hour per week, full-time firefighter/EMT with the majority of our personnel being Volunteer.

The District currently has six Resident Volunteer Firefighter/EMTs, two In District Volunteer Firefigher/EMTs and four Volunteer Intern Firefighter/EMTs. The District needs more local volunteer members to help protect the communities of Lowell, Fall Creek and Unity. You will receive all the training you want locally, all you need to do is apply. Contact the District office for more information and the opportunities being a Lowell Fire District volunteer might bring. Congratulations to all those involved.

Training Coordinator Lloyd Hall has successfully completed the licensing exams for the National and State Advanced EMT also. Lloyd and Resident Firefighter/EMT Morgan Stevens are now enrolled in the upgrade class for State licensing at the EMT-Intermediate, and should be completed with this training and testing in October.
