Outdoor Burning Projected to Open October 15th

The open/backyard burn season is scheduled to begin October 15th, barring a long stretch of hot dry weather. The Outdoor Burn Season is regulated by Lane Regional Air Protection Agency, (LRAPA), who determines when outdoor burning will be allowed based on atmospheric conditions and the travel of the smoke generated by outdoor burning. This determination is made daily, so you must contact LRAPA every day would wish to burn to assure it is allowed.

In addition, LRAPA regulated what materials may be burned outdoors in Lane County. Currently, outdoor burning of leaves, shrub and tree trimmings is allowed without a special permit being obtained from LRAPA and/or the local fire department.

Now Is The Time To Prepare

As the summer months come to a close and the weather starts to let us know that fall is here, it is a good time to start thinking about and preparing for winter storms that can cause some major inconvenience and down right rotten conditions. The first order of business should be to build an emergency kit that can keep you and your family supplied for at least 72 hours. Here is a suggested kit that you can build at home and store in a medium to large size "tote" container for use if disaster should strike.

Be prepared to improvise and use what you have on hand to make it at least three days, maybe longer. Think first about fresh water, food and clean air.

- Water, one gallon per person per day, for drinking and sanitation
- Non-perishable Food at least a three-day supply
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA
 Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlights and extra batteries, seal the batteries in containers to reduce moisture and help prevent corrosion
- First Aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Filter mask or cotton t-shirt, to help filter the air
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener if kit contains canned food
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Important Family Documents
- Items for unique family needs, such as daily prescription medications, infant formula or diapers

Develop a Family Emergency Plan. Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so plan how you will contact one another and review what you will do in different situations. Consider a plan where each family member calls, or e-mails, the same friend or relative in the event of an emergency. It may be easier to make a long-distance phone call than to call across town, so an out-of-town contact may be in a better position to communicate among separated family members. You may have trouble getting through, or the phone system may be down altogether, but be patient. Depending on your circumstances and the nature of the emergency, the first important decision is whether you stay put or get away.

You should understand and plan for both possibilities. Use common sense and the information you are learning here to determine if there is immediate danger. Watch television and listen to the radio for official instructions as they become available. For more information, visit www.ready.gov
