

# Meet the Chief Day Saturday, August 12th 

On August 12th from 1:00 pm to 3:00 at the Lowell Rural Fire Protection District Main Station on 389 N. Pioneer, we will be hosting a "Meet the Chief Day".

We hope the community will come in to meet the new Chief and his family. Chief Lon Dragt has five adult children between his wife, Samantha, and himself. Lon started his firefighting career with Santa Clara Fire, in Eugene, where he volunteered for a little over 10 years rising through the ranks to Lieutenant. In 2010 Lon was selected as the Volunteer of the Year for Santa Clara Fire.

Lon then accepted a job with Goshen Fire where he stayed for a little over 2 years, where he developed a great working rapport with the various department and districts on the Highway 58 corridor. Lon then applied and was hired with Sutherlin Fire Department as the Assistant Chief in charge of Training. While there Lon assisted in the building of the Sutherlin Public Safety Program where he trained a few Sutherlin Police Officers as well as several Public Works employees in order to help build the volunteer numbers to provide Fire services to the community.

On May 1, 2017 Chief Dragt started with the Lowell Rural Fire Protection District and worked with retiring Chief Keith Hoehn until June 30, 2017. At that time Lon took over full duties as the Fire Chief.

Chief Dragt and his family have moved into Lowell and plan on being part of this and the surrounding community for a long, long time. Chief Dragt plans to continue to build the volunteer department that Chief Hoehn had been leading for 13 years. He hopes to build the resident program as well as a shift program for people that are thinking about a career in the Fire and or EMS system.

We look forwarding to seeing everybody on the 12th of August.

# LOWELL SCHOOLS: We're on the Move...

Hello Lowell Families!
We hope you are enjoying your break and taking advantage of all of the summer recreation activities, camps, and lunch programs! We at the district are spending this time preparing for another great school year.

One of our goals was to apply for an OSCIM Program Matching Grant. The Legislature set aside $\$ 100$ million for the OSCIM Matching Funds Program. The great news is that after a lot of hard work and dedication, we were awarded the grant!
Now, what does this mean to us? If the Lowell Community approves a bond in the November 2017 election, we will receive matching grant money up to $\$ 4$ million. With the passing of a bond, the Lowell School District will receive a dollar for dollar match of funds. Please note the OSCIM Program can only match the proceeds from the local bond. Without the passing of the bond, Lowell School District will not receive the grant funds.

If the bond is approved, proceeds would be used to:

- Make safety and security upgrades in both school buildings;
- Build a new gym and wrestling room and convert existing high school gym into multipurpose center/performing arts venue;
- Modernize and renovate the interior of both school buildings, including new upgraded mechanical, plumbing, lighting, and technology systems; and,
- Add new classrooms at high school, replacing existing math room, special education room, and weight room.

This is a tremendous opportunity for the Lowell School District and the Lowell Community! The next step in the process would be for the Lowell School Board to approve placing the bond on the November Ballot. If our district chooses to take advantage of this incredible opportunity, the matter will go to the community for a vote in the November election.

The Middle Fork Willamette Watershed Council will be hosting a bicycle tour of the Mill Race to the Springfield Utility Board drinking water intake located just off the Middle Fork path for an out-and-back route featuring several tour stops along the way. The Mill Race Path is not only an exciting new transportation and recreation option in Springfield, it is also a corridor of water quality improvements being done by a wide range of local organizations.

Some of the highlights include:

- Mill Race history and significance in community stormwater filtration
- Springfield Clean Water Trailer - learn how you can organize your own clean water work party!
- Youth restoration and water quality monitoring projects along the Mill Race
- Willamalane restoration at the Mill Race pond
- Fish habitat enhancement projects
- Drinking water storage, filtration and water quality
