Lowell Brass Wins District 12, Headed To State Finals

Six of Lowell Music's finest young people have managed another first for LHS and small schools of our kind. On February 23rd, they took high score in the "Large Ensemble" category while competing at the OMEA District 12 Solo/ Ensemble Festival. This is uniquely different from OSAA Band and Choir, in that Solo/Ensemble features small, conductor-less groups and does not differentiate for school classification. In other words, all participants are competing head-to-head for a ticket to State. Seniors Ian Sotomayor and Jason Stratis, juniors Owen Chapman and Taysian Williamson, and sophomores Nicky Sotomayor and Timmy Stratis, outscored all comers -- each of whom hailed from 5A and 6A schools -- to take the District Championship, and will head to Pacific University for State Finals on April 26-27 (times TBD).

Winter Storm Response

Monday, February 25 was supposed to be an uneventful snow day. Instead, we all woke up to one of the biggest storms in local history, with snow totals ranging from 18-24 inches. The immediate result was fallen trees, downed power lines, impassable streets, and total loss of power in Lowell.

While caught off guard, our staff immediately responded with measures to sustain basic services and support local partners, including the following:

- Reporting downed power lines to Lane Electric
- Hauling diesel fuel from Springfield for the City and Fire District
- Transitioning the Water Plant, Sewer Plant, Lift Station, and Water Reservoirs to generator power
- Providing public information through the City website, Facebook, and bulletin board postings
- Forwarding City Hall phone lines to the Water Plant
- Conducting welfare checks and assisting residents with special needs
- Contracting for snow and tree removal to open at least one travel lane for emergency vehicles and traffic

On behalf of our staff and the City Council, there are many organizations and individuals that we would like to sincerely thank for their support and hard work during the event:

- Lowell Fire Department for conducting welfare checks, providing an emergency warming shelter, coordinating with AT&T to improve cellular phone service, and responding to emergency calls
- Lowell School District for plowing roads, providing meals at the warming shelter, and setting up the fuel station to provide a sustainable supply of diesel for generators at the Schools, Fire Department, Water Plant, Sewer Plant, Lift Station and Water Reservoirs
- Jerry Valencia and Roy Nelson for volunteering to plow roads and driveways
- Jason Prenevost with J&K Electric for being on-call and responding to electrical issues throughout the event for the City, Lowell School District, and Lowell Fire District
- Chad and Dave Corwin with C&D Land and Tree for plowing streets, clearing and removing hazardous trees
- Daniel Bessett with Portable Rock Production for plowing streets
- Jimmy and Mindy Martini for temporarily opening Bridge Town Market for residents to purchase groceries and essential supplies

This was a historic snowfall for Lowell. While I am very proud of our community response, there is always room for improvement. In the coming weeks and months City staff will work with the Lowell Fire District and Lowell School District to share lessons learned and plan for the next event.

Green Waste Facility Open

Staff and contractors continue to remove trees, limbs, and debris from the right-of-way. The Green Waste Facility (Sewer Plant, 240 South Moss Street) will be open all next week to accept tree limbs and other yard debris. We are also working on a plan to assist residents that do not have access to a truck or trailer to haul debris. Please stay tuned to the City's website or Facebook page for additional details early next week.

New City Councilors Appointed

At the February 19, 2019 meeting the City Council interviewed three (3) candidates for City Council Position 3 and Position 4. After the interviews concluded the Council appointed Samantha Dragt to Position 3, which expires December 31, 2020, and Tim Stratis to Position 4, which expires December 31, 2022. Both positions will be on the May 2020 ballot to serve the remaining unexpired terms.



Kidsports Baseball to Start

Spring is just around the corner and that means baseball season is starting! This year the youth teams (K-8) will be signing up out of district through Kidsports. The season will begin with some baseball clinics to help improve children's skills. Clinics will run every Friday and Sunday for grades 5-8 and Friday only for grades K-4, and will continue weekly until the season begins in April.
