Downtown Master Plan Adopted

The Lowell City Council adopted the Downtown Master Plan at their City Council meeting on July 16. The plan was developed in partnership with residents and stakeholders through fifteen (15) outreach events and opportunities, including a household survey mailed to Lowell residents.

The following vision and goals – crafted from this outreach – guided the development of the Downtown Master Plan.

<u>Vision</u>: A quaint downtown with a central park, multi-story mixed use buildings, a variety of homes, and wide sidewalks connecting to Dexter Lake's recreational opportunities.



Goals:

- 1. Quaint Downtown Downtown Lowell will be defined by gateways, have its City Hall at the center, and streets will be walkable with slow traffic.
- 2. Central Park A central park will be at the heart of downtown and provide a tree-lined, comfortable place for pedestrians.
- 3. Multi-Story Mixed-Use Buildings Buildings in the downtown area will be a mix of commercial and residential uses with a diversity of businesses.
- 4. Variety of Homes Homes in the downtown will be a mix of sizes and be available to a wide range of income levels
- 5. Connected, Wide Sidewalks Downtown Lowell will incorportate and interconnected system of sidewalks and multi-modal pathways to better connect green spaces and amenities such as Dexter Lake.

The vision and goals were utilized to develop strategies, policy recommendations, and projects to increase walkability, improve connectivity to parks, encourage housing diversity, and link community benefits to all aspects of development.
