Lowell School Board Election Tuesday, May 18, 2021

One of the greatest assets a district possesses is its School Board. Lowell School District Board Members are dedicated individuals who selflessly and tirelessly serve this District. They are exceptional people. On May 18, voters will be asked to choose who will continue this legacy for the District.

This year, the Lowell School Board has three open positions up for election. The three board members currently holding those positions are Joyce Donnell, Michael J. Galvin and Jim Chapman. After very esteemed service to the Lowell School District, Ms. Donnell has decided not to pursue re-election. Seeking election to her previously held Director Position #2, and running unopposed, is Jason Prenevost. In Director Position #3 is incumbent Michael J. Galvin, who is also running unopposed. Jim Chapman, incumbent, is vying for Director Position #4 versus Jerry Valencia.

School Board Candidate Responses

Position 4: Incumbent Jim Chapman and challenger Jerry Valencia

Jim Chapman's responses:

- 1. I am running for the Lowell School Board because I am a supporter of the Lowell School District. My purpose is to do whatever I can to make sure Lowell Schools are excellent in: maintaining and improving facilities including safety, in hiring and keeping the very best staff; teaching traditional curriculum; maintaining fiscal responsibility; continuing the amazing extracurricular programs (especially music and athletics); and, promoting positive, open communications among all involved. I will listen with an open mind to your concerns and questions.
- 2. I began teaching music at Lowell in 1976 and moved here in 1978. In addition to teaching music, I trained the bus drivers, drove bus as a sub, served on negotiation teams, and was even a brief cheerleader advisor. After retirement I have served on the Lowell School Board for eight years to add my support for the schools. I also spent several years recycling newspapers and giving the proceeds to the current excellent music department. I have been involved for 43 years as a parent and grandparent of our family attending Lowell.
- 3. One question I have been asked: do I support school choice? Yes. Carol and I were on a committee in 1974 that planned and implemented the first charter school in Eugene. When MVA asked to become affiliated with the District, I was the only board member to oppose. I was concerned that the competition would damage the Lowell schools. Since then it has not proven to be true. I am pleased that we offer three choices for parents and it has benefitted the District financially and in parent choice. I am a long time proven supporter of Lowell Schools and would be proud to represent you.

Jerry Valencia's responses:

- 1. Our district is extraordinary in that we have a public school, a charter school and a home school academy. These options keep Lowell competitive, brought new families to our community, and created opportunities for students to be successful in the Lowell School District. The Lowell School District has done a great job creating educational options for families. I am running for the Lowell School Board because I want to continue our collaborative relationship for the betterment of all Lowell students and to make sure we are preparing students for the next phase of their life.
- 2. I have been involved in the Lowell School District for 20+ years; three of my children were part of the District. Athletics changed the direction of my life and I was able to earn a wrestling scholarship to the University of Oregon. I have volunteered with the wrestling team and announced at football games. I also served on Lowell's Capital Improvement Plan committee, was a business mentor with RAIN, helped implement Lowell's Cool Schools grant, and have worked with Senators and Representatives on behalf of small schools. - 3. Along with incumbent candidate Mr. Jim Chapman and current board member Mrs. Dionne Plahn, I have a multigenerational investment in the community that I hope to extend to the future, keeping Lowell families in Lowell Schools. I am committed to a continual investment in our community and a maximization of our local resources.

From the Mayor's Desk by Mayor Don Bennett

The City Administrator has started to work on the upcoming 2021-2022 fiscal year budget. The process involves estimating incoming revenues and then allocating money to cover normal day-to-day operations, plus any new projects. Every dollar received is designated for a specific use and held until needed. In a

household budget, continuous decisions are made on where and how money is spent. Governmental budgets are much more restrictive.

Our budget has three major funds: General Fund, Water Fund, and Sewer Fund, with several smaller funds. Each fund has a breakdown for: Revenue Income, Personnel Expenses (payroll, insurances, taxes, retirement) and Material and Service Expenses (repairs, engineering, chemicals, lab tests, electric).

The General Fund receives most of its revenue from taxes and fees collected by agencies outside of Lowell. Property taxes and Oregon liquor taxes are two examples of these external sources. This money is used to support all the daily activities for parks, public safety, community development, library, code enforcement, municipal court, and streets functions.

Lastly, Lowell operates two business-like activities that generate revenues by selling water and sewer services. Money collected from monthly utility bills are separated and applied for use by either the Water Fund or Sewer Fund. These two funds have their own itemized Personnel Expenses and Material and Service Expenses. For example, in March the Council approved \$26,923 for the purchase of 100 new water meters. These meters will be used for new construction and to replace aging meters. The invoiced cost of the meters will be deducted from the Water Fund's Material and Service Expenses, and the man-hours needed to install the meters will be deducted from Personnel Expenses.

Detailing how money is received and spent is a challenging but necessary process for City Hall to ensure transparency in the handling of your money. Hopefully, this explanation offers some understanding into the City's financial activities.



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City Council, Planning Commission, and Committee Actions:

At its April 6th work session, City Council worked on the following items:

Received a presentation from Andy Vobora, VP of Stakeholder Relations with Travel Lane County; received a presentation from Becky Taylor, Senior Transportation with Lane County Public Works, regarding the Safe Routes to School project; reviewed proposed Ordinance #303, "An ordinance granting Douglas Services, Inc., locally known as Douglas Fast Net (DFET), a non-exclusive franchise for the construction, operations, and maintenance of a fiber optics telecommunications system", reviewed scope of services from City Engineer on water treatment plant tracer study, and, received department updates from the Public Works Director on various public works projects.

At its April 7th meeting, the Planning Commission took the following actions:

- Approved a variance request to the front yard setback for Lots 45, 47, 49 and 51 of the Sunridge Second Addition Subdivision.
- Issued a recommendation to City Council to approve a slope easement vacation on the plat of the Second Addition Sunridge subdivision.

The April 13th Blackberry Jam Festival Committee meeting was cancelled.

At its April 20th regular meeting, City Council took the following actions:

- Approved two community grant applications totaling \$3,500.
- Reviewed a liquor license renewal.
- Tabled action on the proposed Ordinance #303 granting Douglas Services, Inc. a non-exclusive franchise until the May 6th City Council meeting.
- Approved resolution #760, "A resolution adopting a 'cross-connection and backflow opt-in/opt-out program."
- Approved a "Water Treatment Plant Tracer Study" with Civil West Engineering in the amount of \$9,003 and to authorize the City Administrator to sign and accept the scope of services
- Authorized the City Administrator to purchase a digester blower for an amount not to exceed \$6,000.

May Is Best Month to Help Prevent Summer Wildfires

Residents play a major role in protecting their lives and property. Your home ignition zone extends up to 100 feet – and it's quite common to have neighbors whose home ignition zone overlaps yours. Once a structure is engulfed in flames, it could ignite other structures located less than 100 feet away. In addition, many communities have commonly owned property, including natural or wooded areas that can pose fire risks to all. This means that to be most effective, neighbors need to work together and with their fire service partners to achieve greater wildfire safety. Together, community residents can work with fire agencies and elected officials to accomplish the following:

- Ensure that homes and neighborhoods have legible/clearly marked street names and numbers
- Know "two ways out" of the neighborhood for safe evacuation during a wildfire
- Create phone and text trees to alert residents about local fires
- Sign up for emergency notifications through Lane County "Alert Me" program
- Talk to your Homeowner Association (HOA) to make sure you are in compliance with existing community rules or regulations on vegetation management and construction materials and if they are "Firewise-friendly"
- Engage with the fire district officials on how they can work with you and your neighbors, and participate in the "Ready, Set, Go!" program
- Participation in the Firewise Communities/USA Recognition Program, they can provide the community with a risk assessment and action plan that will help residents work together annually to make where they live a safer place.
