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#### Lowell Music Again Finishes "Tops" in the State (2A/1A)

The amazing musicians of Lowell High School have pulled off yet another impressive feat! Even with COVID-19 providing countless new obstacles, the LHS Band and Choir found ways to play and sing and even "compete" with schools from across Oregon. While traditional in-person State Championships were not possible this year, OSAA was able to administer a "Culminating Event" for bands and choirs who submitted a video of live performance for adjudication. The LHS Band received a rare *Superior* rating -- the highest possible scoring level -- and was one of only 16 schools from around the state to do so (all classifications). Not to be outdone, the LHS Choir was one of only 17 groups in Oregon (all classifications) to also score their own *Superior* rating. Most impressively, Lowell

was the only 2A/1A school in Oregon (public or private) to achieve these high marks in both categories!

"I am so proud of these kids," says Music Director Paul Burch. "It's been such a difficult year, and without our usual routines and opportunities, motivation has been a struggle. But, they really stuck with it and showed some never-give-up resolve! Our future is bright, and I can't wait to see what they're capable of next." Meanwhile, our middle school bands were able to have a spring concert, staged in Rolling Rock Park on June 10th. The open-air venue allowed for the Lundy Beginning Band and the Lowell Intermediate Band to conduct Lowell Music's first public performance in over 15 months! The kids from both groups did an amazing job, and have very bright futures in the program, which hopes to "get back to normal" in the fall (fingers crossed!).



The LHS Band received a visitation and clinic from OSU Band Professor Dr. Erik Leung on May 24th. This rare honor was amazingly positive, inspiring, and a great way to finish the year!

#### Wrestling Wrap-up

Middle School Wrestling had a short season this year with limited schools participating. We focused less this year on technical moves and more on intensity and move execution. #### **City Council and other committee/commission actions:**

At its June 1<sup>st</sup> budget public hearing, work session, and executive session, City Council took the following actions:

- Held public hearings on the 2021-2022 budget.
- Discussed the marketing process for the city's vacant E. Main Street property.
- Received an update on the library renovation project.
- Reviewed several contracts.

At its June 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting, the Planning Commission took the following action:

• Approved a variance request for Land Use Application #2021-05.

At its June 8 meeting, the Blackberry Jam Festival Committee agreed on holding a car festival on July 24.

At its June 15 regular meeting, City Council took the following actions:

- Approved the budget for 2021-2022.
- Approved an agreement for accounting services.
- Approved an agreement with the City of Oakridge for Law enforcement services.
- Approved a resolution for budgetary transfers.
- Approved an adjustment to the employee pay scale.
- Approved water and sewer master planning projects.
- Approved an asbestos removal project.
- Appointed two new members of the Blackberry Jam Festival Committee.
- Approved an agreement with Lane County for right-of-way permitting.
- Approved a motion affirming that the City Administrator is meeting job expectations.

#### "From the Mayor's Desk" by Mayor Don Bennett

About 20-25 years ago, two 200 ft wells were dug at Paul Fisher Park, and a complete sprinkler system was installed but never activated. A few years ago, the system was pressurized and tested. Sprinkler heads popped up and worked like new, but there were large wet areas where lines had been cut. We were told we needed to install a totally new system that would cost \$25,000—money we didn't have. Graham Landscape and Design has recently repaired the system so it will cover the entire park for much less. The system is on City water and needs to be switched to well water for economic reasons. A well will be tested for flow rate, electrical power added, and a pump motor installed, but this project is moving forward.

Here's an update on the Maggie Osgood Library and temporary City Hall. The major snow event in 2019 damaged the roof over the old library and limited the use of City Hall. The City purchased the Jehovah's Witness church and held community workshops to develop a Facilities Plan. A lot of great ideas were included in the Plan. The estimated cost for the library renovations was \$300,000, and a new City Hall would cost \$1,700,000. Again, this is money we don't have. One option we are considering is to expand the library building to provide more space for a City Hall. This would delay the need to build a new City Hall. Grants, pre-budgeted dollars, and bank loans will be needed to complete the Library and City Hall renovations. Lowell operates on a very lean budget. We will need outside resources, like grants, to complete major projects. Grants normally require some level of matching funds. Matching funds mean we must seek a bank loan for our portion. The plan is to open in the spring/summer of 2022.

### FROM THE LOWELL FIRE DISTRICT

#### **Back Yard Burning Season Closed**

Just a reminder that the back yard burn season closed June 15<sup>th</sup>. Outdoor burning of tree trimmings and yard debris is now prohibited. Recreational fires are still permitted as long as the fire is no larger than four square feet, with flames no higher than four feet in height. The fire must be built on bare ground (dirt), and away from combustible surroundings. The material being burned must be clean and dry, producing little to no smoke or embers. There must be a person in attendance at all times while the fire is active. As the weather gets warmer and drier, <u>all</u> outdoor burning is likely to be prohibited, so stay informed and check the burning regulations often.

#### Protect Your Home From Wildfire - Use This Prevention Checklist

It looks like summer is here with temperatures rising quickly, so remember to prepare your home and property for the possibility of wildfire. Here is how you can prevent wildfire on or around your property. There are some fairly easy things you can do to help make your home and out buildings safe from wildfire. Review this checklist to help make your home wildfire safe. For more information on wildfire prevention practices, go to the district website or visit our main station in Lowell.

- Is your address clearly visible from the road? If you need an address marker, contact the district for one.
- Is your driveway/roadway clear of obstructions, can a fire engine or other emergency vehicles get to your home? Driveways/roadway surfaces need to be at least 12 feet wide and have at least 13 ½ feet height clearance so the emergency vehicles can get to your home. Curves must be of adequate dimension to allow for emergency vehicle clearance, and there must be room for vehicles to turn around.
- Remove limbs and branches that overhang your roof. Prune lower limbs to a height of 15 feet and thin trees or remove them from within 30 feet of your home.
- Keep your roof and gutters free of debris, leaves, needles, small branches and moss.
- Keep woodpiles, firewood and other combustibles at least 30 feet from your home and out buildings.
- Block off openings under your home, and decks with solid sheeting or fine-mesh wire, 1/8<sup>th</sup> inch metal screen works best. Screen attic vents and louvers also.
- Use only fire resistive roofing on all buildings. Class A asphalt shingles, metal to tile.
- Develop an escape plan and an emergency action plan. If a wildfire occurs near your home, you should have a plan for evacuation that includes important personal items and escape routes. Build an emergency evacuation kit that you can easily take with you if you are asked to evacuate your property in an emergency.

#### **Think Water Safety This Summer**

In recent weeks the district has participated in a number of water rescue incidents that included overturned rafters in the Middle Fork of the Willamette River, to boating accidents in our local lakes. We would like to remind everyone to be smart in and around water.

Whether at home or enjoying our local waterways, it is always important to keep safety in mind when in or near water. Drowning can happen at any time of year, but be especially cautious during the summer months when drowning incidents can increase by as much as 89% as compared to the rest of the year. When the weather turns warm, as it is now, everyone naturally wants to be in or around the water to help stay cool. Hanging out at the pool or the lake on a hot day is a great way to beat the heat. For people between the ages of 5 and 24, drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death. It doesn't have to be that way, though. Most water-related accidents could be avoided by knowing how to stay safe and following a few simple guidelines. Learning how to swim is essential if you plan on being on or near water. Many organizations provide swim instruction to folks of all ages, check to see what classes are available in our area.
